## Ramping Up! Rev. Teri Schwartz

The church has many entry points. Some of them are physical.

This month, we are proud to offer a new accessible entry in the back of Pennington Center. First U is pleased to share our space with the Little People Learning Center, the preschool that operates on the second floor of Pennington. They are expanding their services to provide infant and toddler care on the first floor of Pennington. For fire safety, we need two accessible exits with ramps for evacuation cribs in the event of an emergency. This is a win-win; we now have an accessible entry and exit at our parking area to better serve our congregants, our guests, and to ensure safety for the littlest ones that make our church their home every weekday.

Deep thanks to our Director of Operations, Michael Knowles, who coordinated the project with all parties; Richard Pardo, our

volunteer Building Engineer, who designed the ramp in compliance with ADA requirements; and Ivan Lappin and his company who were contracted for construction services.

Changing our physical space changes how we move in the building—and in our minds and spirits. That can change who we are and who we are becoming. This month, we are ramping up to kick off our capital campaign on June 10th. We will raise over \$1 million for the restoration and repair of our building and facilities. Key building improvement priorities include ensuring the structural integrity and restoring the aesthetics of the sanctuary; increasing building accessibility; renovating the Parish House to create more functional event preparation and comfortable meeting spaces; and reducing our carbon footprint through proper climate controls and other energy efficiency measures.
