## When Should I Call My Minister? Rev. Teri Schwartz and Rev. David Schwartz

Each year we share this growing list of reasons for you to get in touch with us. The list isn't exhaustive, but it's a good starting point. Some of you are seeing it for the first time; for others, this is a reminder: We your ministers want to be helpful when you face a spiritual crisis, think you might benefit from a chat or advice, or simply need a listening ear.

As your ministers, we believe we might help you navigate the challenges of life transitions, difficult choices, or grieving a loss. We don't claim to have answers to all of life's persistent questions—and we're not therapists—but we are pretty good listeners, and often we ask useful questions or can provide a good resource.

We are not clairvoyant, however; we cannot know when we are needed unless you tell us. Even if—sometimes especially if—other people know about your needs, we still must

be told. This is especially true in the event of injury and illness: Given federal patient privacy laws, hospitals won't call us when our church members are admitted, nor can they verify that you're there.

Don't hesitate to be in touch! You're not bothering us with your problems; you are not taking time away from more important things. *You* are important. Helping you is one of the main reasons for us to be ministers; helping you is what our time is for!

Our list of a few of the reasons why you might get in touch with us starts on the next page... (Continued)

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1. When you have an important choice to make: education, career, relationship, reproductive choices, etc.
2. When you have personal problems, job loss, family difficulties, a new diagnosis, mental health problems, or financial strain.
3. When you are at a transition or turning point.
4. When your conscience is troubling you.
5. When you want to talk about religion or you're wrestling with a spiritual issue or your spiritual path.
6. When you need encouragement, or perhaps prayer or a blessing.
7. When you wish to celebrate a success and express gratitude.
8. When you need help finding your way at the church, getting involved, or making friends here at First U.
9. When you have children to be named, dedicated, or blessed.
10. When you want to get married.
11. When you have marriage or relationship problems, especially lasting more than a month. Often we wait until our relationship drastically deteriorates before reaching out—reach out early!
12. When you or a loved one is going into the hospital or is going to be, whether it's routine or an emergency visit.
13. When you can't come to church for a prolonged time and you'd like a visit.
14. When there is a death or pregnancy loss in the family.
15. When you wish to discuss funeral arrangements ahead of time.
16. When you are arrested or in jail.
17. When you have a question, concern, or suggestion about something. Most questions can be cleared up by simply asking! While we can't implement every suggestion, your input does matter!
18. When you are angry with the minister or upset with something in the church.
19. When you have prospective members for the church in mind.
20. When you do not yet know the minister and would like to get acquainted.
21. When you simply want someone to talk with.

## Give Away the Basket: Seeking Nominations!

We give away our Sunday offering twice a month to agencies in the community who are working for the greater good. We select four recipient organizations who receive roughly six offerings each. All members and friends are invited to nominate potential

recipient organizations. At the annual meeting in May, all members vote to select the recipients for the coming year.

Recipient organizations must generally meet the following criteria:

- 501(c)(3) status.
- Can demonstrate fiscal responsibility and accountability; can provide annual reports, audited financial statements, etc., if requested.
- Operates with annual budget of less than \$500,000. There may be exceptions to this, particularly in response to a timely and critical problem; e.g. donation to Red Cross following a disaster.
- Organizations whose work contributes in some way to a more just, equitable, and compassionate community, in alignment with our mission and UU principles. (In addition, this church has preferred to support local South Side and Chicago organizations.)
- Recipients are not to be controversial or political in nature.
- Recipients are independent of the church or other UU organizations.
- Repeat gifts: an organization shall receive only one allocation from the church every two years. (Exceptions to be made by the board under unique circumstances.)

If you have a worthy recipient organization that meets these criteria, you may download and fill out the application form ([a Word document on our website](#)) with your nominated organization's information and the signatures of seven other church members or friends. Please note, signatures can be "virtual"—once you've received support, you may type in your supporters' names.

Send the form to [giveaway.nominations@gmail.com](mailto:giveaway.nominations@gmail.com) by May 6. Electronic applications are strongly encouraged, but you may also print the form and submit a hard copy to Rev. Teri's box in the church office.

Senior ministers retain the discretion to postpone a collection or reduce the number of Sundays designated to accommodate unexpected needs (e.g. large-scale disasters).

The selection process will be democratic and transparent. Nominations can be made at any time, by any member or friend of the congregation, by completing a nomination form, obtaining seven members' signatures in support, and submitting the completed application to Rev. Teri.

All nominations that are received by May 6, 2018 and meet the selection criteria will go before a congregational vote at the annual meeting. Congregants may also vote online before the meeting. Each voting member will get to vote for four organizations.

### **2018 Give Away the Basket Timeline**

**May 6:** Nominations are due. Electronic submissions are preferred.

**May 13:** A summary document of all received nominations will be distributed at church with the order of service, and by email.

**May 13–May 21:** Online voting.

**May 21:** Ballots will be distributed at the annual meeting

**May 28 & June 4:** Winning nominations announced!

Forward Together encourages us to think a little outside of the box about who we see of when we think of mothers, from immigrant women facing deportation to mothers in jail. To honor the less fought for, this organization recommends people to do service work to benefit these groups. There is much adults can do for those types of mothers with the help of kids.

Still thinking outside the box but focusing on the little things and back towards your life, who are the mothers in your child's life who might not have been placed by nature in the role of being a mom? Siblings, fathers, aunts, uncles, caring friends, and teachers? We will be hosting a book discussion by Dr. Michael Hogue, Meadville Lombard Theological School, on his new book,

American Immanence: Democracy for an Uncertain World. This event is hosted by Meadville Lombard, First Unitarian Church, and the Seminary Coop Bookstore.

In the book, Hogue opposes the dominant American theopolitical tradition, which has resulted in global social, economic, and environmental injustices, with a new form of political theology containing a radical democratic politics as the dominant feature. Drawing from a dissenting immanent tradition in American religious and philosophical thought, he articulates a political theology committed to democracy as an emancipatory way of life. Rather than seeking to redeem or be redeemed, Hogue argues that the vulnerability of life today calls us to build radically democratic communities of responsibility, resistance, and resilience. American Immanence integrates and immanent theology of, by, and for the planet with a radical democratic politics of, by, and for the people.

**Conversations on the Proposed 8th Principle**

 Our Unitarian Universalist Seven Principles  
 were designed to be dynamic: not to be a  
 fixed creed, but a description that lives and

develops over time. Beginning in 2013, a group of UUs in Philadelphia argued that our existing principles lack a crucial statement of something we already believe, but act on too little. Dismantling systemic injustice, they argued, may be suggested by our current principles, but needs to be explicit if we're going to take it seriously. So, they proposed an 8th principle:

Journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

In this conversation after the service, moderated by Rev. David, we'll learn history and background from Darrick Jackson and Kellie Kelly, two Chicago-area ministers who have closely followed the 8th Principle proposal. We'll hear different takes on it, positive and negative. And then we'll break out into small groups to discuss or consider our individual responses to it.

**183rd Annual Meeting of the First Unitarian Society of Chicago**

We gather each year as a congregation to make vital decisions about who holds leadership positions, the budget for paying for church operations in the coming church year, which organizations receive the Give Away the Basket offerings that we collect twice each month, who will represent us as delegates to the UUA General Assembly in June, and two bylaw amendments--giving us more options for scheduling the Annual Meeting in future years, and simplifying the article on councils and committees.

Those who have been members for at least 90 days and have contributed at least \$50 of record during the 12 months preceding the meeting (or for whom the ministers have



waived that requirement this year) are eligible to vote.

Formal notice of the meeting will be sent by May 4, and will include the complete text of the proposed bylaw changes, which were the subject of a hearing on March 25. Attend the budget hearing after the service on May 6 to get a copy of the proposed budget, and to learn and ask questions about it.
